Partnerships and Collaborations

Mid Atlantic Arts values the relationships with our many trusted partners across the region, the United States, and internationally that extend the reach and impact of our programs. We recognize the National Endowment for the Arts, our state and jurisdictional arts agencies, fellow regional arts agencies, donors, funders, service organizations, and other stakeholders as key allies in fulfilling our mission.

Equity and Access

Mid Atlantic Arts acknowledges that long-standing systems and practices within the arts sector have led to significant barriers to equitable access and investment for individuals and across communities. We are committed to the implementation of equitable practices through intentional and sustained focus and accountability.

2024 Programs

Accessibility Offerings include convenings and training opportunities support our commitment to greater accessibility in the arts and cultural sector of the mid-Atlantic region. In partnership with Americans for the Arts, we offer free webinar packages on arts and disability justice for local and state arts agencies in the mid-Atlantic region. Mid Atlantic also provides travel reimbursement to State Arts Agency partners in our region for training related to best practice in accessibility and disability justice, including attendance at LEAD with support from the National Endowment for the Arts.

Artist Fellowships—Mid Atlantic provides administrative support for the individual artist fellowship programs for the states of Delaware and New Jersey. Mid Atlantic staff convenes panels that review over 2,000 applications yearly and states participating in this partnership annually award over \$2 million to the fellowship winners.

ArtsCONNECT supports touring projects collaboratively developed by presenters working together in the mid-Atlantic region. The tours include performances as well as complementary engagement activities designed to create greater understanding or connections between artists, audiences, and communities.

Through grants and peer learning opportunities, ArtsHERE invests in organizations that have demonstrated a commitment to equity within their practices and programming, with the goal of increasing arts participation for underserved groups/communities, and sharing insights that may inform similar funding programs in the future.

Central Appalachia Living Traditions (CALT) is a multiyear program designed to promote the understanding and recognition of folk arts and culture in Central Appalachia by investing in cultural communities, seeding new folk and traditional arts experiences, and honoring underrecognized practitioners of traditions across the region.

The Folk and Traditional Arts Community Projects Grants fund projects designed to support the vitality of traditional arts and cultural communities in the mid-Atlantic region. Eligible project activities include but are not limited to performances, public art collaborations, workshops, trainings, exhibitions, fieldwork, and artistic collaborations and must include a publicly accessible component.

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Iber Exchange increases availability of music programming from Ibero-American countries throughout the mid-Atlantic region to promote a greater understanding of other cultures through the performing arts. Support grants of up to 50% of the negotiated artist fee are available to nonprofit presenters in the mid-Atlantic region that contract artists from the roster, for a public performance and community engagement activity.

Information Services—Mid Atlantic Arts provides information on the arts to artists, arts organizations, constituents, and stakeholders of the mid-Atlantic region on a regular basis and through a number of communication platforms. Information is provided via monthly newsletters, eblasts, social media postings, and press releases. Mid Atlantic Arts manages midatlanticarts.org providing detailed information on Mid Atlantic, its programs, and grant opportunities for artists and organizations.

Jazz Road is an artist-centric touring and residency grants program to spread jazz throughout the country, strengthen work opportunities and compensation for jazz artists, and bolster deeper engagement between jazz musicians, presenters and communities. U.S.-based jazz artists who define themselves as emerging to more established along a career spectrum are eligible for support. The program is intended to support jazz artists for which this grant would have new and significant career impact. Jazz Road is administered by South Arts.

The Jazz Touring Network is a presenter-based membership program that supports professional development, building partnerships, and working together to curate tours that reflect the richness of the field of jazz. Once selected, membership is ongoing upon meeting annual requirements.

Established in 1994, the **Living Legacy Jazz Award** honors living jazz master artists residing in the mid-Atlantic region who have kept the spirit and tradition of this evolving art form alive, maintaining the vitality of jazz for future generations through advocacy, mentorship, and the transmission of artistic skill and cultural knowledge.

Mid Atlantic Tours brings the best of the performing arts to communities across the mid-Atlantic region. Presenters select from a curated roster of artists that changes annually but maintains a programmatic commitment to a diversity of performance genres, regional artist representation, and engagement with communities underserved by the arts.

The National Leaders of Color Fellowships is a

transformative leadership development experience curated by WESTAF to establish multicultural leadership in the creative and cultural sector. By partnering with the other United States Regional Arts Organizations, the program has expanded nationwide, and its mission has become a national endeavor.

Open to presenters nationwide, the **Performing Arts Global Exchange** is an annually curated roster of international performing artists selected to tour to communities across the United States. Each year, a region is featured with a selection of artists across multiple disciplines. The program provides fee support directly to nonprofit presenters programming artists from the roster, and presenters host both public performances and community engagements in achieving the program's goals of cultural exchange and understanding.

It is a joint program of the National Endowment for the Arts and the Poetry Foundation. Mid Atlantic Arts produces the finals competition during which state and territorial winners from the United States compete for more than \$100,000 in prizes.

The **Special Presenter Initiatives** provide additional opportunities for the support of small to mid-sized performing arts presenters in Delaware, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and West Virginia. Fee support is available for engagements of performing artists based anywhere worldwide. Engagements include performances as well as community activities that enhance the performance experience and offer meaningful exchanges between touring artists and a presenter's community.

USArtists International[®] supports in-person performances by American artists at engagements at international festivals and global presenting arts marketplaces outside of the United States. The program funds individuals and ensembles across all performing arts practices and disciplines.
